

Multi-Tasking Distractions: When Workers Have to Juggle It All Picture This



This image shows an active construction site where a forklift is moving along an interior road between work zones. The operator is seated in the cab with one hand on the wheel and the other holding a phone to his ear, his eyes angled slightly downward toward the device rather than on the path ahead. Ahead of him, a worker in a dark vest – not the required high-visibility green – has stepped off the sidewalk and is crossing the road, unaware of the approaching forklift. There are no designated pedestrian crossing markings on the road. No spotter is present. No barrier separates foot traffic from vehicle traffic in this area.

Two people are each doing what they think is manageable in that moment – one taking a call, one crossing a road. Neither has full situational awareness, and the forklift is closing the distance between them without slowing. Distraction does not require a dramatic lapse in judgment to be fatal. It requires only a moment of divided attention at the wrong place and the wrong time. On any worksite where heavy equipment and people share the same space, a phone call, a glance away, or a moment of inattention can eliminate all reaction time before a worker even knows something has gone wrong. Full attention is not a courtesy on a job site – it is a survival requirement.
