

Scaffolding & Access: Safe Erection, Use and Dismantling Picture This





This image shows a multi-story residential construction site where a climbing scaffold system is being hoisted upward along the side of the building using a crane. Riding a scaffold while it is being hoisted by a crane is never how these systems are designed to be used, no matter how routine it may seem on a busy job site. What looks like a shortcut to reach the work area faster is, in reality, removing every layer of protection the equipment was built to provide. A scaffold that shifts or inverts mid-lift gives workers no time to react and no safe way down. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions exactly, use scaffolds only as designed, and never ride a scaffold being moved by a crane or other lifting equipment. The few extra minutes it takes to use the correct access method are minutes a worker will have for the rest of their life.
